

HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Yemeni people continue to bear the brunt of ongoing hostilities and severe economic decline. An alarming 22.2 million people need some kind of humanitarian or protection assistance. An estimated 17.8 million people are food insecure, 16 million do not have access to safe water and sanitation, and 16.4 million cannot access proper healthcare. More than 8 million men, women, boys and girls do not know how they will obtain their next meal.

CERF RESPONSE

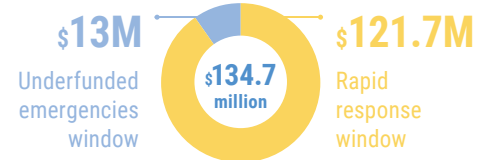
Since 2015, the CERF has allocated \$134.7 million for people affected by the conflict. When the situation deteriorated in 2015, CERF allocated \$44 million to enable the rapid scale-up of life-saving aid. As the humanitarian needs further increased in 2016, CERF bridged a crucial gap by providing \$15 million to sustain critical activities. In May 2017, CERF allocated \$25 million to respond to the immediate needs of malnourished people

and severely food insecure people. When cholera response activities needed to be expanded, the CERF provided \$600,000 for logistical support to the operation. Most recently in 2018, the Emergency Relief Coordinator approved the largest-ever CERF allocation of \$50 million to assist 1.6 million people, including 363,000 women and 826,000 girls and boys, suffering in the face of escalating hostilities.

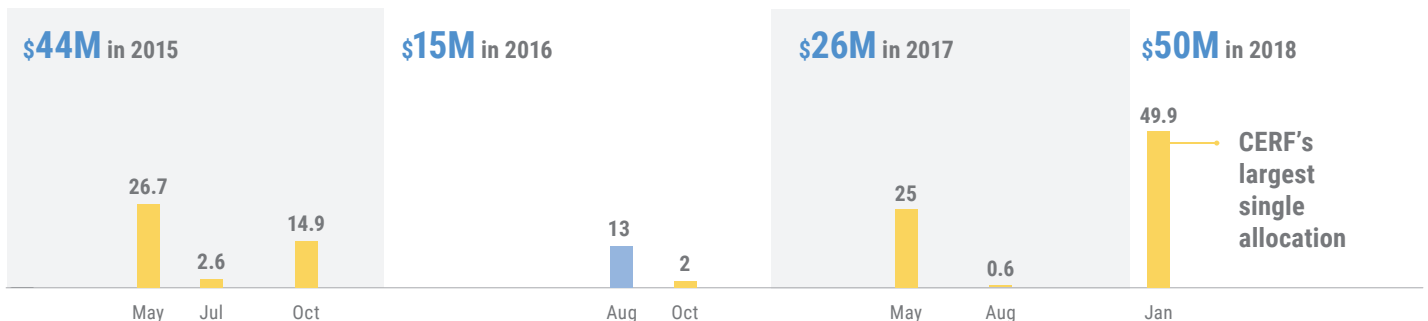

Allocations by windows in US\$ million

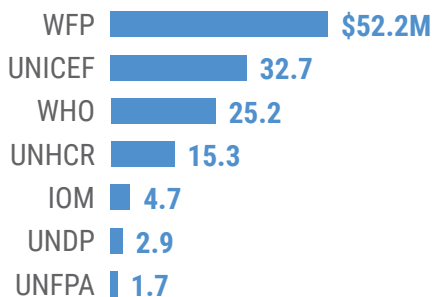


Allocations timeline in US\$ million
